

Kura Updates Te Awatea







Te Awatea and Te Kawenga have enjoyed spending as much time as they could in the school pool as this term the focus was on water safety. The tamariki had the opportunity to learn the essentials of staying safe around water but also had the chance to try on life jackets, fostering a practical understanding of safety measures. These aquatic exercise complemented our weekly Yoga sessions with Whaea Angela, where the tamariki discovered their mind-body connection. The combination of water safety lessons and calming yoga practices aligned with our daily Hikatia te ha ritual, guiding the children to bring their wairua down to tau. This holistic approach not only promoted physical well-being but also instilled a sense of mindfulness and balance in the tamariki of Te Awatea and Te Kawenga.




Kura Updates

Whaea Zhar, with her wealth of knowledge, shared some of her experiences with our tamariki of Te Kawenga and Te Awatea, delving into the intricate world of Harakeke. Through her insightful teachings, the children learned the art of harvesting the flax plant, accompanied by a meaningful karakia. Whaea Zhar instilled a sense of responsibility as she shared essential practices on caring for and nurturing the Harakeke plant. The learning extended beyond theory as the tamariki engaged in hands-on activities, crafting putiputi (flowers) and kakahu (clothing) from the versatile material. Whaea Zhar also shed light on the plant's medicinal properties, providing a holistic understanding of the significance of Harakeke in Te Ao Māori . our tamariki were so lucky to be able to acquire practical skills and a deep appreciation for the cultural and ecological importance of this revered native plant.

Kura Updates Te Haeata







Te Haeata, Te Awatea, and Te Kawenga have beautifully embodied the spirit of tuakana/teina, fostering a strong bond through shared experiences in each others' learning spaces. Spending quality time together has allowed them to get to know each other, creating a foundation of friendship and mutual respect. Te Haeata, in particular, has emerged as a pillar of support, offering awhi to those in need with genuine kindness. In a collaborative effort, all akomanga engaged in a creative endeavor centered around the Huia bird, drawing and decorating feathers. Stepping outside the conventional classroom setting, we ventured into the sandpit, where imagination took flight. Together in groups they crafted their own island or sandcastle, representing the unique purākau they had collectively woven. This holistic approach to learning not only strengthened their connection but also demonstrated the essence of manaakitanga in their shared educational journey.

The four lambs lovingly raised by Te Hapai O whānau became cherished members of the kura hāpori through attentive care and dedication. From their early days, the whānau ensured the lambs received nurturing attention, feeding them at regular intervals and organising exercises to keep them healthy and active. When the time for shearing arrived, Whaea Mel enlisted the help of a knowledgeable friend, drawing upon years of experience to demonstrate the shearing process to the tamariki. This hands-on learning opportunity left the children fascinated, connecting them to the intricacies of farming practices and fostering a deeper appreciation for the animals they had cared for with such devotion.
